


If You Give a Tiger a Taco

It was a hot, summer day in August when a girl named Phoebe Ann Mosey was born. The world would know her as Annie Oakley, a famous markswoman.

Annie grew up in Darke County, Ohio. Her father, Jacob Mosey, died of pneumonia. Being one of seven children, Annie's mother sent her to an infirmary when she was only nine. She came home a year later to find out her mother was remarried to Joseph Shaw. Her mother had another child, but that child died when she was less than two years old.

At the age of eight, Annie began trapping and shooting. She could shoot rabbits with her dad's gun and trap squirrels using acorns that had fallen off trees nearby. She used some of these animals to feed her large family and sold others to neighbors for money. Annie was so successful with shooting, she could pay for her family's mortgage.

Annie was invited to a shooting match from a rich hotel owner because of her extraordinary shooting skills. The goal was to shoot 25 targets without missing a single shot. Annie made every shot while her opponent, Frank Butler, missed the last one. They soon were engaged and were married in 1876. Frank admired Annie's excellent shooting skills. She could shoot a dime tossed into the air 90 feet away, while standing on a moving horse!

Frank starred in a show, but soon his partner became ill. Annie took his place and that was when they began performing together. She took the stage name "Annie Oakley", which was who she would forever be known as. No one really knows where the name "Oakley" came from.

Annie and Frank met Buffalo Bill in New Orleans. He offered for them to perform in his western show, Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. They said "yes", of course. Annie and Frank were very popular in the show. Annie shot corks out of bottles and shot playing cards, the thin side facing her.

The show traveled cross-country and performed many places in Europe such as Southern France, Spain, Italy, Austria-Hungary, and Germany, from May through October. The show also performed for Queen Victoria of Great Britain, for her 50th Anniversary in 1892.

Annie and Frank returned to the United States in 1892. On October 29, 1901, the show members were on a train. Before the train reached the destination they were headed, it crashed! Annie, luckily, recovered from the accident within four months.


Annie and Frank were still continuously traveling and had now been doing this for nearly twenty years. Annie's hair was turning whiter. She knew it would be best if she retired from Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, but she didn't want to quit acting for the rest of her life. She tried acting again in a production called "The Western Girl."

In November of 1922, Annie had fractured her hip and an ankle in a car accident. She had to wear a brace, but that didn't keep her from shooting. On November 3, 1926, Annie died from pernicious anemia, a disease where the red blood cells in her body increased their size. Annie had never fully recovered from the car accident. Two weeks later, Frank died.

Annie was a beloved celebrity who was an incredible idol. The world shall never forget the marvelous lady she was.



Which Power Source is the Best for Trains to Run On?

The world is taken over by non-renewable power sources. There is a type of transportation that is so forgotten, it's as if it has vanished from the face of the earth. There are many types and uses of power sources and they each have their own advantages and disadvantages. Trains run on different types of fuels and they work differently. Some fuels are economical and some pollute our ecosystem. If we choose



the right power source for trains to run on, then we can make a tremendous impact on this universe!

Did you know power sources help the world by providing heat, light and motion? There are two categories of power sources. One type is non-renewable power sources such as oil, natural gases, petroleum, coal, diesel, gasoline and nuclear power. These power sources are harmful to the ecosystem and they are damaging our future. The other category is the renewable power sources such as geothermal, hydroelectric, wind and solar power. These power sources help make the world green as a lime and clean as a whistle. They also give living things a chance to survive in our future.

Trains come in many different shapes and sizes, but all use power sources to generate motion. A steam engine uses coal and fire to provide steam, which moves the pistons to turn the wheels. Unlike a steam engine, a diesel-electric engine converts diesel fuel into electricity that can be used to power the train. An electric train is powered by an overhead power line or sometimes a third rail. The overhead power line contains electricity in them. The pantograph of the train is attached to the power line and collects the electricity as the train goes. The third rail also does the same thing, but that is on the rail and does not need a pantograph. That electricity is turned into motion to help power the train.

Power sources and trains are like puzzle pieces. If you can choose the right one, you can create a better future. Some power sources would not work because they need a power plant. The best power source would be inexpensive, clean, renewable and also suitable to be used on a train. To find the power source(s) that are/is the best you have to filter them. First, we know oil, natural gases, petroleum, coal, diesel, gasoline and nuclear power are definitely not the best because they are not renewable. Also, geothermal is out, because it is the most expensive one out of all of them. Next, neither a hydroelectric dam or a wind turbine is suitable to fit on a train. Finally, solar is clean, so it is the best power source for trains to run on.

Trains use different power sources to provide motion. Power sources are split into renewables and non-renewables. Renewable power sources are good for the environment. All in all, solar power is the best for trains to run on.


